## Keynote speakers



Gintaras Grušas, archbishop of Vilnius, Lithuania

Title: Pilgrimage to Vilnius as an Encounter with Divine Mercy

Grušas was born in Washington, D.C. He earned a BS degree in Mathematics and Information Science at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA). Grušas began his preparation for the priesthood at the Franciscan University of Steubenville in Steubenville, Ohio. He then earned a Bachelor of Sacred Theology degree at the Pontifical University of Saint Thomas Aquinas (Angelicum). He was ordained a priest on 25 June 1994. He earned a Licentiate of Canon Law in 1999 and a Doctorate of Canon Law in 2001 from the Angelicum. From 2001 to 2003 he was rector of the seminary in Vilnius. In 2010 Pope Benedict XVI named him Military Ordinary of Lithuania and he was consecrated a bishop on 4 September. In 2013 Pope Francis appointed him Archbishop of Vilnius. In 2014 he was named a member of the Congregation for the Clergy. In 2016 – a member of the Secretariat for Communications. Since 2013 – President of the Bishops' Conference of Lithuania. In 2021 he was elected President of the Council of the Bishops' Conferences of Europe.



#### Vitor Ambrósio

Title: Pilgrimages – material and immaterial constructions

Ph.D., has been teaching at Estoril Higher Institute for Tourism and Hotel Studies (Portugal), since 1991. He also teaches in several Master and Doctoral programs from other Institutions. Prior to this he had worked as a travel agent promoter and tourist guide. His main research interest is Religious Tourism: his PhD Thesis is on Religious Tourism – The Development of Sanctuary Towns; he is the author of the book Fátima as a Religious Centre for Incoming Tourism; he is also the author of several book chapters and scientific articles on Religious Tourism.



## **Jaeyeon Choe**

Title: Inclusive and Sustainable Spiritual Tourism Futures in Southeast Asia

Originally from Korea, Jaeyeon Choe obtained her PhD in Tourism Management with a minor in Cultural Anthropology from The Pennsylvania State University. She currently works at Swansea University, UK and is a Visiting Professor at Hue University, Vietnam. She is an Associate Editor of Tourism Geographies, and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. After mindfulness research in the USA, Jaeyeon explored wellness and spiritual tourism in Southeast Asia, and is currently studying pilgrimage tourism in Wales. She keynoted at several tourism conferences in Southeast Asia. She recently co-edited a book, Pilgrimage Beyond the Officially Sacred: Understanding the Geographies of Religion and Spirituality in Sacred Travel (Routledge, 2020).





#### **Community of Lithuanian Pilgrims**


The Community of Lithuanian Pilgrims was established in 2004. The aims of the organization are to consolidate Christian pilgrims in Lithuania, to take care of the natural and cultural heritage of the sacred sites of Lithuania and to organize pilgrim journeys. The Community of Lithuanian Pilgrims organizes various projects associated with pilgrimage and sacred places of Lithuania and publishes various publications for pilgrims. The most significant projects include organization of woodcarver contest-exhibition "Saints and pilgrims" (4 events had been held since 2009), and various publications as the monograph of D. Liutikas "Pilgrimage. Manifestation of Values and Identity in the Journeys" (2009), the four-disc album "Prayers and Hymns of Vilnius Verkiai Calvary" (2010), documentary "Pilgrimage sites in Lithuania" (2012), map guide "Pilgrim Routes in Lithuania" (2014) and religious tourism route "The Way of Grace" (2021).

#### **Institute of Sociology (LCSS IS)**

Institute of Sociology (LCSS IS) is a branch of the State Research Institute – the Lithuanian Center for Social Sciences, a public legal entity operating as a state budget institution and carrying out long-term research and experimental (social, cultural) development, important to the State, society, international cooperation or economic operators. It is a venue for the training of doctoral students in Sociology. Five departments of the Institute of Sociology – the Department of Labour Market Research, the Department of Ethnic Studies, the Department of Regional and Urban Studies, the Department of Social Change and Inequality Studies and the Department of Social Policy Research - implement Long-term Research and Development Programme of the LCSS funded by the state budget, as well as national and international research projects funded by the Research Council of Lithuania, the European Union, and other international bodies and organizations, including industry and business entities. The Department of Regional and Urban Studies research includes the main trends and specific characteristics of regional and urban development. The current research in the field of tourism is being carried out during the project 'Transformations and perspectives of the tourism sector after the COVID 19 pandemic' (2021-2023). This project has received funding from European Regional Development Fund under grant agreement with the Research Council of Lithuania.
